



Dr. Carlos Singer is Professor of Neurology and Director of the Division of Parkinson's Disease and Movement Disorders of the University of Miami, designated as a National Parkinson Foundation Center of Excellence. He received his medical degree from the Central University of Venezuela in 1972. This was followed by training in Internal Medicine at the University of Pittsburg and in Neurology at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine Affiliated Hospitals. Dr. Singer received additional training in Electromyography and in Movement Disorders at the University of Miami. Dr. Singer is board certified in both Internal Medicine and Neurology. He has been a member of the faculty of the Department of Neurology of the Miller School of Medicine/University of Miami since 1989. He chaired the working group on "Non-Motor Manifestations of Parkinson Disease" of the Parkinson Study Group from 2006 to 2010.

He is a member of the American Academy of Neurology, the American Neurological Association, International Association of Parkinsonism and Related Disorders, the Movement Disorders Society, the Parkinson Study Group, the Huntington Study Group and the Dystonia Study Group. He established the first Botulinum Toxin Treatment Program for Neurological Disorders in Florida in 1990 and has been director of the Huntington Disease Clinic at the Miller School of Medicine since 2000. He currently serves in the editorial board of the Journal of Neurological Sciences and the Journal of Clinical Movement Disorders. His current interest is in sleep-related complications and gait and balance disorders in Parkinson disease. In 2011 he was honored with the Faculty Hero Award by the University of Miami Medical Group for his patient-centered service. Dr. Singer has published more than 150 articles in the field of Movement disorders.
